Rosemary Clayton Memorial Scholarship Program

I picture Rosemary with her beautiful smile and giving a heavenly nod of approval for SIMV's fourth year of the Rosemary Clayton Scholarship Award program.

For the benefit of the new members, the Rosemary Clayton Scholarship was established in memory of a dear friend. Rosemary Clayton was dedicated to improving the lives of women and girls at both the local and international levels. A resident of Moreno Valley and loyal member of SIMV and other service organizations, Rosemary was a model of selfless volunteerism, faithful friendship, and service to her community.

Since this memorial program was launched in 2015, SIMV has steadily increased the scholarship's collective impact. In 2015, we had 3 applicants and awarded a single \$1,000 scholarship. In 2016, we had 4 applicants and awarded one \$1,000 and one \$750 second place scholarship. In 2017, we had 6 applicants and awarded two \$1,000 scholarships (including one to a Dream It Be It participant) and four \$500 runner-up scholarships.

With that little walk down memory lane, SIMV's Rosemary Clayton Scholarship Committee (Shirley Y and Pat Box) has completed the judging of 8 applications for the 2018 awards. We had to be a bit creative to stretch the budgeted funding far enough to recognize all applicants. As a result, SIMV will award two \$1,000 scholarships (including one to a 2017-2018 Dream It Be It program participant) and 6 runner-up scholarships (\$400 for 2nd place; \$300 for 3rd place; and another four at \$200). We are pleased that SIMV was able to continue its trend of helping all applicants with their educational endeavors. In hopes of increased fundraising for the 2018-2019 club term, it would be FABULOUS to also increase the program's collective impact to even higher levels. Fingers crossed . . .

Dream It, Be It (DIBI) Recap 2018 (by Pat Box)

SIMV's second season of Dream It, Be It: Career Support for Girls program at Bayside Community Day School is now a part of our club's history. I am confident that everyone involved in the planning and delivery of this 8-month adventure (7 workshops and wrap-up party) would agree that although it involves a lot of work, the satisfaction received from really making a difference in the lives of our students is SO WORTH THE CLIMB. None of the program outcomes would have been as successful without such a fabulous team of co-facilitators. So here's a huge THANK YOU to Ruth Salley, Shirley Y Morgan, Nina Thomas, LaDonna Jempson, Denise Fleming, and Sandy Ferguson. Besides helping the students achieve your workshop's learning objectives, you also made a real connection with the girls through your personal stories. Special thanks to Ardith Turner and Gwen Murphy for putting the gift bags together; those are always a big hit with the girls. And thank you, Nina, for securing Kama Burton for the keynote speaker. She was so inspiring and memorable—and certainly the high point of the wrap up party. And thank you, LaDonna, for facilitating the student recognition certificates from State Senator Richard Roth and State Assemblymember Jose Medina.

Student evaluations are the true test of our local program's effectiveness. So let's get right down to the nitty-gritty. In a 5-scale rating, this is how our students ranked their participation in the 2017-2018 DIBI workshops:

- * 100% agree/strongly agree "I feel more confident about my future success"
- * 100% agree/strongly agree "I feel more prepared to pursue my career goals"
- * 88% agree/strongly agree "I have new tools to overcome obstacles to my success"
- * 86% agree/strongly agree "I have new tools to overcome setbacks"
- * 100% agree/strongly agree "I understand how my values can connect to possible careers
- * 100% agree/strongly agree "I know women who want to support my professional aspirations"
- * 100% agree/strongly agree "I was introduced to professional role models"
- st 100% agree/strongly agree "I had an opportunity to create achievable goals for my future"

For the question, "What was your favorite part of Dream It Be It," the responses were:

- * By telling us there is support for us
- * Everything has helped, and I learned something new each time
- * It makes me think of my goals constantly
- * Learning new things
- * How to overcome setbacks

For the question, "What additional support do you need to live your dreams":

- * 6 replied: More mentoring opportunities from a local Soroptimist member
- * 1 replied: On-line mentoring
- * 3 replied: An on-line group of girls who have completed Dream It, Be It
- * 7 replied: An opportunity for funding to support education or career training
- * 1 replied: People to talk specifically about the careers we want to achieve

All of these results have been shared with Soroptimist International of the Americas to gauge overall program effectiveness and to identify improvement strategies to benefit all participants throughout our Federation.

MY question to SIMV members is, "Who wants to join me in Season Three of Dream It, Be It at Bayside?" I have some ideas about how we might address a few of the "additional support" needs. Let me know if you are interested in being a workshop leader, a motivational speaker, or participate in student-led interviews about your career path. There are 7 sessions, one per month, from September through March. It is likely that the Wednesday class schedule will change times to 10:06-11:06 AM.
